If this page opened in Access-a-Reader, everything is set: your browser hands PDFs to Windows, and Windows sends them to Access-a-Reader. Use it as a first file to try things on.

Try the Page options. In Dark mode the page goes dark and the text light, while the red heading below keeps its red, the yellow tip keeps its yellow, and the picture keeps its colours.

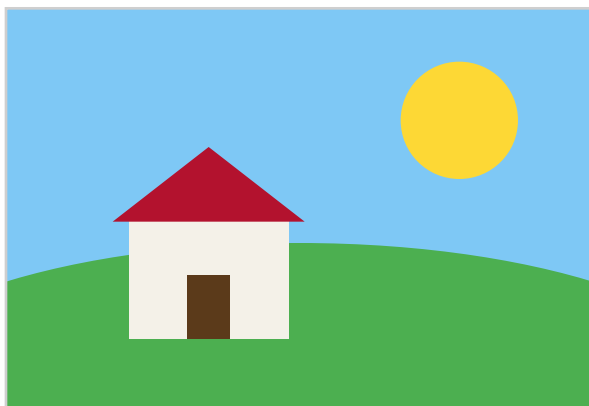
Chapter 1 Dark mode done right

Most dark modes simply flip every colour, so a photo turns into a negative and a red warning box becomes a cyan one. Access-a-Reader keeps the hue of every colour and treats pictures as pictures, so a textbook page reads the way its designer meant it to, only easier on the eyes.

Faint grey text is a common problem in PDFs. Text brightness lifts it toward white without touching the page shade, and the Brightest setting takes it all the way.

Tip

Press C to open the options sidebar, S for Settings, and Ctrl + F to search the file. Switch to Reader view for one clean column of text with your own size and spacing.



A picture stays a picture: in Dark mode its colours are still its colours, softly dimmed so they do not glare.

Page options can show pictures at full strength, or darken them further.
